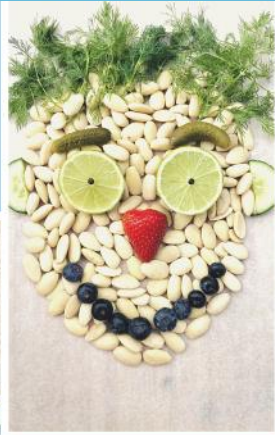

Building Update



Assembly Hall Progress Update

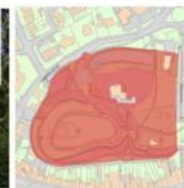
Building work on the new Assembly Hall continues to make really good progress despite the current situation. Work on both the roof and the guttering has been finished completely; window frames and glass have been installed in the rooms on the first floor, at the top of main hall and in the Drama room. On the exterior, the stone arches at the front entrance and the decorative brickwork are nearly complete. All internal block work is now complete with all rooms fully formed. Work has now begun on the inside with plaster boarding underway.



Year 7 Local History Work

Earlier this term, our Year 7 Historians began studying local history as part of Local History Month. A few examples of their work can be seen here.

The castle was used to save the memory of William earl warren who in old days dwell there. Richard Barnes at his own expense erected this gateway in the year 1777.



Reigate Castle

It is located- 2 High St, Reigate RH2 9PU

Today, nothing remains of the castle itself other than the mound on which it once stood, the mock medieval gate was built using remains from the original castle in 1777. The castle grounds are now a public garden.

- In 1216 the castle was one of many captured by the French in southern England, including Chichester Castle. The castle became property of Fitzalan, earl of Arundel, in 1347, and from 1397 was owned by a variety of Lords of the Manor of Reigate. It was occupied until the 16th century but began to fall into disrepair thereafter. The Castle was a C12 construction of motte and bailey type with a shell keep, but none of the masonry survived.

William de Warren of Surrey order the caste to be built. He was governor of Rouen in 1135. Around 1150 the Warrens ordered a town to be constructed below the castle.

It was demolished in 1648 after occupation as a garrison during the Civil War by followers of a Royalist uprising.

The significant people involved in this site in history?

King William, William de Warenne, Earl of Surrey, Earl of Arundel.

Where is Reigate Castle?

Has it's use changed over time? The castle has changed over time because most of it was gotten down and and only what's left of is the gateway and it is now a public place by a variety of people.

What was Reigate Castle's purpose in the past? The purpose of Reigate castle in the past was to save the memory of William Earl of Warenne. Richard Barnes at his own expense erected the gateway in the year 1777. It was named a public place by a variety of people.

Any other interesting facts? Around 1150 the de Warrens ordered that a town be constructed below the castle. In 1216 the castle was won one of the many captured by the French in Southern England, including Chichester castle. It was demolished in 1648 after occupation as a garrison during the medieval war by followers of a uprising.

REIGATE CAVES

THE BARONS' CAVE IS PART OF THE DEMOLISHED NORMAN CASTLE AND IS ONE OF THE OLDEST SHOW CAVES IN BRITAIN. THE MAIN ORIGINAL USE OF THE CAVES WAS FOR STORAGE. THE SOUTHERN SECTION WAS BUILT BY BLACKISTON AND SON AS A STORE FOR WINES, BEERS AND SPIRITS. IN THE 20TH CENTURY, THIS STORE WAS TAKEN OVER BY ADAMS'S STORES, WHO HAD A SHOP IN WHAT IS NOW THE CAFÉ ROUGE. THE NORTHERN PARTS OF THE CAVES WERE USED AS A BEER CELLAR BY REIGATE'S ONE TIME LOCAL BREWER, MELLERSH AND NEALE. THEIR BREWERY WAS WHERE THE MORTON'S CAR PARK NOW IS. IN THE SECOND WORLD WAR, SOME OF THE TUNNELS BECAME A RESERVE LOCAL CONTROL CENTRE FOR EMERGENCY SERVICES, AND THE SECTION AT THE NORTHERN END BECAME A PUBLIC AIR RAID SHELTER, RUN TOGETHER WITH THE SHELTER IN THE WEST SIDE CAVES.

MORE COMMONLY KNOWN AS REIGATE CAVES THE BARONS' CAVE IS ONE OF BRITAIN'S OLDEST SHOW CAVES. IT IS PART OF THE OLD NORMAN CASTLE, WHICH WAS DEMOLISHED MANY YEARS AGO, AND IS ONE OF REIGATE'S OLDEST SURVIVING MEDIEVAL FEATURES. THE CASTLE WAS PROBABLY BUILT BY THE SECOND EARL OF SURREY, WILLIAM DE WARRENNE, SOON AFTER 1088. NOBODY KNOWS HOW EXACTLY OLD THE BARONS' CAVE IS. THE OLDEST REFERENCE TO IT DATES FROM 1586 WHEN CAMPDEN DESCRIBES "AN EXTRAORDINARY PASSAGE WITH A VALLED ROOF HEWN WITH GREAT LABOUR OUT OF THE SOFT STONE" DOORS AND WINDOWS WITH A SIMILAR PROFILE TO THE CAVE PASSAGES WERE BEING BUILT FROM ABOUT 1200 ONWARDS, BUT WE MUST BE CAREFUL BEFORE DRAWING ANY CONCLUSIONS FROM THIS.
